








TOTAL CCTV INCIDENTS BY COUNCIL APRIL 2022 – MARCH 2023






This chart shows the total number of CCTV incidents split by HDC and Cambridge City Council from April 2022 through to March 2023.



There has been a significant increase in requests compared to last year, however the number of downloads is almost the same as 21/22.



TOTAL OUT OF HOURS CALLS RECEIVED APRIL 2022 – MARCH 2023








- OOH call numbers have remained at a similar level to the previous year (4115 vs. 4289 in 2021-2022)

TOTAL OUT OF HOURS CALL CATEGORIES APRIL 2022 – MARCH 2023








TOTAL CCTV INCIDENTS LINKED TO HBAC & CAMBAC APRIL 2022 – MARCH 2023

CCTV INCIDENT HIGHLIGHTS

- Our CCTV Operators regularly achieve fantastic results and we would like to share a number of highlights captured over the last quarter.
- The following incident write ups include a mx of crime and non-crime across both councils.
- We have experienced some excellent results; from pro-active arrests to tracking down some of our most vulnerable residents; saving lives and preventing crime from the control room.







REACTIVE ARREST – THEFT – CAMBRIDGE

Incident 9555 – 9TH April 2022 – AS, GB



CATALYTIC CONVERTER THIEF ARRESTED

A call was received from police, asking for observations at a city centre car park where a reported catalytic converter theft was in progress.

Operators deployed cameras and could see a car that had been jacked up, they relayed this information to police along with a description of the cars involved and their index numbers.

Observations were maintained as police officers made their way to the scene, a description was taken of the male seen at the scene. When police were nearing the location the male in question ran to his vehicle and started to make his way down the multi storey carpark levels. He stopped on level 5 and was seen exiting the vehicle, and running away on foot. Police officers began chasing the male and eventually caught him a few streets away from the crime scene. He was arrested and taken away in a police van.



PRO-ACTIVE ARRESTS – DRUGS - CAMBRIDGE

Incident $9644 - 15^{TH}$ April 2022 - MO, MP



DRUG DEALERS ARRESTED

Operators noticed two males at a city centre cash machine, they seemed very aware of the cameras and were acting suspiciously. Observations were maintained as the pair walked around the city centre, at one point one of the males was seen to take something out of his trousers, and a short time after this he was seen ducking down behind a car as if hiding from the cameras.

The male was then seen diving into the rear seat of the car, along with the other male and a third male joined them, getting into the driver seat. Once they were all in the car operators used the cameras to observe a package of white powder being exchanged for money, an obvious drug deal taking place. This information was all relayed to the police via airwaves and officers were deployed.

Officers arrived, the male who had been seen buying the drugs ran away and managed to lose the officers who chased him. The other 2 males were arrested and found to be in possession of drugs and imitation firearms.

This pro-active arrest is a great example of operators using their intuition and spotting people who are acting suspiciously – a great result.



REACTIVE INCIDENT – PUBLIC WELFARE – ST NEOTS



Incident 9960 – 4th May 2022 – PM, LM

CONCERN FOR FEMALE

Operators spotted a female walking towards the town centre bridge, as it was the early hours of the morning and she was alone they decided to maintain observations.

As the operators watched the female cross the bridge, she stopped and climbed over the railings, police were informed and officers were immediately despatched. The bridge was closed off at both ends and several police units arrived on scene. Paramedics also arrived on scene and fire brigade were put on standby.

After police officers spoke with the female for a while she climbed back over the railings and was then led to an ambulance.

This proactive work from the team potentially saved a life on this occasion, a fantastic result.



PROACTIVE ARREST – BIKE THEFT – CAMBRIDGE

Incident $10169 - 16^{TH}$ May 2022 - CJ, MO



BIKE THIEF ARRESTED

Operators spotted a male trying the force the lock off an expensive bicycle locked up in the city centre. He was seen removing the lock and then stealing the bike, cameras were deployed and observations were maintained, police were informed. The suspect stopped to talk to someone and his identity was confirmed, he was a known bike thief and had been arrested in the past, this information was relayed to police and observations continued.

Police arrive at the scene, confirm the identity of the male who had specific court orders not to be with a bike unless he could prove it was his and not to have tools that could be used to steal bikes. He was arrested and taken away in a police van.

A great example of proactiveness, and a bike thief stopped in his tracks!



REACTIVE ARREST – OFFENSIVE WEAPON - CAMBRIDGE



Incident 10623 – 8th June 2022 – CJ, AW, MP

MALE ARRESTED FOR CARRYING A KNIFE

Operators received a call over the airwaves from police, reporting a male walking around the city centre with a knife. A clear description was taken and cameras were deployed.

The male in question was located almost immediately, outside a city centre shop. Police were informed of his location and observations were maintained. The male started walking away from the shops just as officers arrived, they intercepted the male and he was arrested.

This was quick work by the operators and police, a potentially very dangerous incident was prevented.



REACTIVE INCIDENT – THEFT – HUNTINGDON



Incident 10844 – 16th June 2022 – LM, MC, EFF

GROUP OF SHOPLIFTERS APREHENDED

Operators received a call from a town centre premises via the HBAC radio. They had deterred a group from stealing £150 of items, their descriptions were taken and cameras were deployed.

Soon after, the group were spotted walking through the town centre. Operators continued to observe the group as they split up and went into different premises, always coming out with different items, which were suspected to be stolen. Eventually they were seen exiting a shoe shop, carrying several pairs of shoes and then leaving the location and heading to the bus station. Police were informed of this over the airwaves and officers were dispatched. They caught up with the group and finally stopped them after they were seen throwing stolen items over a wall.

They were questioned and then taken away in a police car.



REACTIVE INCIDENT - MISSING CHILD — HUNTINGDON



Incident 11443 – 22nd July 2022 – RL, AS, LM

MISSING CHILD FOUND

Operators received a call and email regarding a missing child thought to be in the Huntingdon area, her description is given and the operators deploy cameras and search the area.

Later that evening operators spot a female matching the missing child's description, they maintain observations and inform police who dispatch officers to the location.

After initially denying her identity, the female admits that she is the missing child they have been looking for. She is returned to her home safely.



PRO ACTIVE ARREST— DRINK DRIVING — HUNTINGDON



Incident 11877 – 16th August 2022 – PM, CJ

DRUNK DRIVING PREVENTED

Operators spotted a male leaving a town centre restaurant who appeared to be very intoxicated, he was seen getting into the driving seat of a parked vehicle. Details were passed to police via airwaves and cameras were used to observe the male who was sitting in the car.

Police arrived soon after, they arrested the male and also reported significant damage to the car. Operators used playback to review footage of the area, the car was seen reversing into a gate and causing damage, this information was passed to police.

This proactive work by CCTV operators prevented a potentially very dangerous drink driving incident.



PRO ACTIVE ARREST – CRIMINAL DAMAGE - CAMBRIDGE

CAMBRIDGE CITY COUNCIL

Incident 11999 – 24th August 2022 – GB, RL

MALE ARRESTED FOR CAUSING CRIMINAL DAMAGE

Operators spotted a male chasing a truck in the city centre. Observations were maintained as the male was acting in an erratic fashion and appeared to be intoxicated.

The male disappeared down an alleyway and then reappeared holding a long wooden pole. He jumped in front of a taxi and then went on to strike the windows of several nearby shops. Police were informed immediately and observations continued.

The male was seen walking around the market square with the pole, which he had broken into 2 pieces, he was becoming increasingly agitated and was seen to hit a parked car with the pole as he walked past it.

Officers arrived on scene and arrested the male, he was seen kicking and hitting the van as he was taken into custody.



REACTIVE ARREST – ASSAULT - CAMBRIDGE

Incident 12631 – 2nd October 2022 – LM, EF-F



CONCERN FOR PERSON, ARREST FOR ASSAULT

Operators received a call from police over the airwaves, they were asked to look out for a male who claimed he is being followed by another male. Using the location provided, the cameras were deployed and the male was located, he looked nervous and kept looking around as he walked.

Operators spotted a second male on the opposite side of the road, he was speaking to the informant and paying him lots of attention. Police had advised the male to make his way to the police station, operators maintained observations.

As the male got closer to the station, police officers approached, as they arrived the second male crossed the road and attacked the informant, in front of the officers. He was arrested for assault, put into a police van and taken into custody.



PROACTIVE INCIDENT – CONCERN FOR PERSON – CAMBRIDGE



Incident $12677 - 5^{TH}$ October 2022 - AS, PM

SUSPICIOUS MALE SPOTTED AND REPORTED

Operators observed a male acting in a suspicious manner following a female in the city centre, his description was taken and observations were maintained.

The female was seen to cross a main road and begin walking across the park, the male was then seen following her and walking at speed to catch her up. During this time police were informed over the airwaves and officers were despatched. As the male reached the female, officers arrived and stopped him, they confirmed his ID and that he was know for similar behaviour in the past. He was removed from the city centre and taken home by police.

This is a good example of the important work carried out by CCTV operators and a potentially dangerous incident was avoided.



REACTIVE ARREST – SHOPLIFTING – CAMBRIDGE

Incident 12825 – 13th October 2022 – MP, AW



5 SHOPLIFTERS ARRESTED IN CITY CENTRE

Operators receive a call from a large city centre shop, reporting a theft from their store in the last hour, they confirmed it was a high value of stock stolen. A description was taken and cameras were deployed.

The suspect was spotted leaving another shop close to the scene, she was seen with 2 males who were also reported to be involved. Police were called over the airwaves and officers were despatched, operators kept cameras on the group as they moved away from the scene. The suspects were seen entering 2 separate vehicles, the index numbers were taken and passed to police. The vehicles were seen driving away and their direction of travel was reported. When stopped at traffic lights a police car pulls up alongside one of the suspects vehicles, the driver is detained but the passenger makes a run for it, he is chased by officers and soon gives himself up.

The other vehicle is still being watched, it is currently held up in traffic further down the road. Officers approach the second vehicle and despite trying to drive away the suspects soon give themselves up and area also arrested.

Together with the shop security and police this incident resulted in 5 arrests and recovered goods of over £7000 in value, a great result for everyone involved.



PRO-ACTIVE ARRESTS – DRINK DRIVING - CAMBRIDGE



Incident 16210 – 14th January 2023 – LM, EFF

MULTIPLE ARRESTS FOR DRINK DRIVING

Operators spotted 3 males in a city centre carpark, they all appeared to be intoxicated. They approached a vehicle and got in, the cars index number was noted and relayed to police over the radio. The car left the car park and cameras were used to follow it around the city centre until officers caught up with it.

Once police tracked the vehicle down it appeared to be stopping but then drove away at speed, officers followed it and the cctv operators used cameras to track its location. Eventually the driver lost control of the vehicle and it rolled off the road through a barrier, ending up on its side. Police removed all males from the vehicle, they had sustained only minor injuries. All 3 were arrested, 2 of them were already known to police for drug and weapon offences.



PRO ACTIVE INCIDENT – VULNERABLE PERSON – CAMBRIDGE

Incident 16392 – 25th January 2023 – MO

VULNERABLE PERSON FOUND

An operator spotted an elderly lady in the bus station, she looked cold and vulnerable, dressed in pyjamas and wrapped in a blanket. Police were informed over the radio and they were asked if there were currently any missing people that matched her description. Police did not have a match on their missing persons list and the hospital had not reported any patients absconding but it was made a high priority case.

Observations were maintained until police officers arrived, the female advised them she had left Addenbrookes hospital and was waiting for transport back to her home in Royston. As the next bus was several hours away the officers decided to drive her home so they knew she was safe.

Operators later discovered that the female was reported missing by Bedfordshire police, this was a great result and an excellent example of how our operators look out for the public and help keep them safe.



PRO ACTIVE ARREST – THEFT– CAMBRIDGE

Incident 16445 – 28th January 2023 – MO, AW



MOBILE PHONE THIEF ARRESTED


Operators spotted a male who was involved in a previous theft incident, they deployed cameras and followed him through the city centre. It wasn't long before they observed him passing a group of females and attempting to put his hand in one of their handbags.


Police were informed and his description and location were given over the radio, unfortunately there were no officers available at that time. Observation were maintained. He was seen retrieving a mobile phone from underneath a bin, and then taking multiple mobile phones out of his pockets. He was seen to be targeting drunk and vulnerable females and attempting to take things from their bags.

Eventually he was seen stealing a mobile phone from a female and then quickly walking away, operator reported the theft and this time officers were dispatched. Cameras were used to direct police to the thief's location and also to where they had seen him stash mobile phones. He was arrested and the phones were recovered.



Jail for man who instigated violent disorder in St Ives

A man who instigated a violent disorder in the centre of St Ives has been jailed.

CCTV operators captured the moment 18-year-old Charlie Wilson lead a group of people to Crown Place on 13 October last year to launch an attack on another group of people.

Wilson carried out the first punch before the fight fully broke out.

During the 20 second brawl Wilson was stabbed with a large kitchen knife to the leg before everyone ran from the scene.

Through CCTV footage officers were able to identify Wilson and other members of the group. A bag of blood stained clothes were found bagged up outside Wilson's home and the kitchen knife was found discarded in a wheelie bin in Crown Walk.

At Peterborough Crown Court on Friday (29 April), Wilson, of Lake Gardens, Dagenham, Greater London, was sentenced to 14 months in a young offenders institute after previously pleading guilty to possession of class B drugs and violent disorder.



Apply or register Thanks and complaints Teenage gang terrorised victims in racially aggravated crime spree A group of teenage boys who committed a series of racially aggravated crimes across Cambridge have been sentenced. Griffin McGinley, 18, of The Avenue, March, was jailed for a year while six other teenagers © 13:58 13/12/2022 who can't be named for legal reasons, have been given youth referral orders after being found guilty of conspiracy to commit racially aggravated assaults. The court heard how between 14 August and 27 September last year (2021) the group travelled into Cambridge city and committed up to 40 offences in Mill Road, Hills Road, Burleigh Street, Parkers Piece and Sidney Street. They targeted innocent members of the public with violent and offensive acts, including They threw small rocks at people, as well as cans of drink and squirted others with liquids During one incident they threw bottles of hand sanitiser at one of the victims shouting the word 'virus' at them. On another occasion they targeted a victim who had only been in Cambridge for 15 days after choosing to study in the UK. In another incident, they grabbed a man by the ear and as he confronted them he was assaulted by McGinley, leaving him with a broken nose and needing surgery. At Cambridge Crown Court on Thursday (8 December) McGinley was jailed for a year after being found guilty of conspiracy to commit racially aggravated assault and making off without A 15-year-old from Cambridge, a 16-year-old from Doddington, a 16-year-old from Cambridge and a 17-year-old from Milton, were found guilty of conspiracy to commit racially aggravated assault and sentenced to a 12 month Youth Referral Order A 17-year-old from Doddington was found guilty of conspiracy to commit racially aggravated assault. He was sentenced to the above but also must undertake 80 hours' unpaid labour and

will be electronically tagged for three months.

Referral Order

A 15-year-old from Cambridge and a 16-year-old from Braintree were found guilty of conspiracy to commit racially aggravated public order and sentenced to a 12 month Youth

They were all given a one year restraining order, preventing them from being a pedestrian in

Mill Road, Hills Road, Burleigh Street, Parkers Piece, Sidney Street and Cambridge Leisure Park.

Detective Constable Louise Clarke and PC Aga Strykier, who investigated, said: "This gang terrorised innocent members of the public with violent and offensive acts.

The unprovoked attacked caused widespread concerns amongst the community but, thanks to CCTV, and the courage of witnesses and the victims, we were able to arrest, charge and put them before the courts.

There is no place for hate crime in our community, We will continue to work hard to encourage victims to come forward so we can take action against offenders.'

Duo who ambushed two men in premeditated attack jailed for combined 48 years

Pair who launched a savage attack on two men in Cambridge have been jailed for a combined 48 years.

Remi Loader and Jacob Montique spotted their victims while drinking in a bar in the city on the evening of 20 August 2021.

The duo are believed to have plotted their attack before leaving the bar and walking to Montique's vehicle where they changed into black clothing and donned facemasks. Armed with weapons they returned to the city and hid within the city's Market Square until their victims arrived.

Loader and Montique were captured on CCTV ambushing the two men stabbing them multiple times in an unprovoked attack.

Loader was arrested by officers that night and Montique two days later.

A 30-year-old man suffered stab wounds to the stomach, left leg and left hand while a 37-year-old man was stabbed to the stomach, chest and head. Emergency services were called and the two victims were found nearby where they received medical treatment.

Both were taken to Addenbrookes' Hospital where they were placed in induced comas and admitted for several weeks of treatment. Doctors revealed their injuries would have been fatal without medical intervention. More than a year on and their recovery to full health continues.

The pair were both found guilty of attempted murder, grievous bodily harm with intent and possession of an offensive weapon, following a four week trial at Cambridge Crown Court in April.

At Aylesbury Crown Court on Friday (28 October), Montique, 19, of Bishops Road, Trumpington, was sentenced to 21 years in prison and Loader, 27, of no fixed address, was given a 27 year sentence.

Detective Sergeant Hamish Cowley said: "Loader and Montique are both high harm, prolific offenders who have caused fear within their communities. "This was a planned and premeditated attack, believed to be motivated by revenge from a previous incident, with one using a large hunting knife. Both victims were fortunate to survive the attack.

"This was an extremely complex investigation with limited witnesses or forensic opportunities. With the help of CCTV and mobile phone evidence we were able to place the pair at the scene and this dangerous duo will now be locked away from the public for a considerable amount of time."








TOTAL INCIDENTS BY CATEGORY – CAMBS CITY APRIL 2022 – MARCH 2023











TOTAL INCIDENTS BY CATEGORY – HUNTINGDON APRIL 2022 – MARCH 2023











TOTAL INCIDENTS BY CATEGORY – ST NEOTS APRIL 2022 – MARCH 2023











TOTAL INCIDENTS BY CATEGORY – ST IVES APRIL 2022 – MARCH 2023











TOTAL INCIDENTS BY CATEGORY – RAMSEY APRIL 2022 – MARCH 2023












CCTV CAMERA MAP – CAMBRIDGE CITY AS OF MARCH 2023





CCTV CAMERA MAP – HUNTINGDON AS OF MARCH 2023










