



Data & Trends: Waste Collection

- The waste min team constantly use **data** such as recycling rates and bin rejections to measure our resident's behaviours. In 2024/2025, 50% of material collected was recycled or composted, a decrease from 57% in 2023/2024, predominantly due to the introduction of the charging for green bin collections.







Waste Tonnages 2023/24

Environment Act 2021 Implementation

Home Composters

Approximately 400 units purchased to date.

This offer will continue for 2025/26

The resident pays £10 and the delivery costs directly to GetComposting.

The subsidy applies to a maximum of 2 compost converters per household. Please visit <u>GetComposting</u>, enter your postcode, select Blackwall 220 Litre Black Compost Converter and the discount will be automatically applied.

• Free Soil Improver:

45 requests received; 39 deliveries made to date. Positive feedback from Parish Councils regarding this initiative.

• Community Bin Scheme

All parish councils can request up to 10 community bins for a community location.

These bins need to be accessible for local residents to use to deposit their garden waste and will be collected as part of the normal route scheduling for fortnightly garden bin collections.

It will be the responsibility of the parish council to manage these bins, the same as a household, ie no contamination, out for collection on the collection day.

Litter Minimisation

National

- Littering costs the UK economy almost £1 billion annually.
- Almost 48% of people admit to dropping litter.
- The amount of litter dropped each year in the UK has increased by 500% since the 1960s.
- Cigarette butts are the most common littered item in the UK, making up nearly 40% of litter.

Local

- 1486 bins across the district (litter and dog waste) and 26 staff.
- We collect around 140 tonnes of litter/year.
- In the last year we have had volunteer litter picking from lots of individuals and around 50 organised groups, many of whom have done several litter picks throughout the year.
- Keeping Huntingdonshire clean and litter free costs nearly £1 million every year.

Performance

- We are in the top 6 performing councils for street cleansing even though our costs per head are among the lowest
- Purchased 500 litter picks
- Purchased signage
- Currently reviewing some aspects of the process

Q. What do Astco do with the clothes?

A: Sorting Facility.

Q. Any details re how much is collected?

A: About 40 tonnes / year. (Astco only)

Q. What contract obligations do they have re disposal?

A: Pass it on / Tender / Textiles 2030 member (voluntary initiative) / TRA.

Q. Any results available what is reclaimed from electrical waste?

A: The fast majority is saved, melted and then materials separated by layers. About 15 tonnes.

Q. What exactly goes where in terms of clothes sent to ASTCO?

A: We know that some of it is kept in the UK and some of it is sent abroad. We have asked ASTCO for a full breakdown / report.
